The DGBC Qualifications Framework trains students in religious education, for the BA in Buddhist Dharma and the master's programs for Buddhist teachers, from the perspective of learning outcomes based transformative education. The theological educational model of Buddhist teacher training is based on the cultural linguistic religious tradition and value transmission through the formation of instructor student practice communities. - Developmental Programs and Practices: Lotus Sprouting from the Soil well-intentioned, striving students with average comprehension who can be developed.
- Personalized Advising: Lotus Sunk in the Swamp, No Longer Alive lazy, negligent students who make little progress due to lack of effort (admission of such students should be avoided).
